Merchant Mariner Seaman

Flight Attendant

How to Enter the Field:

1. Meet the Basic Requirements

- Age: Typically 18–21 years old minimum (varies by airline).
- Education: High school diploma or GED (college degree is a plus but not required).
- Height: Must be able to reach overhead bins (some airlines have height restrictions).
- Appearance: Some airlines have grooming standards.
- Legal Status: Must be eligible to work in the U.S. and have a valid passport.
- Background Check: Must pass a criminal background check & drug test.
- Customer Service Experience: Airlines prefer candidates with experience in hospitality, retail, or customer service.

2. Develop Key Skills

- Communication & Interpersonal Skills – Handling passengers professionally.
- Emergency Response Training – CPR, first aid, and evacuation procedures.
- Multilingual Ability – Speaking multiple languages is a major advantage.

- If hired, you'll go through 4–8 weeks of training at the airline's training center.
- Training covers emergency procedures, first aid, FAA regulations, customer service, and aircraft-specific training.
- Training is unpaid or low-paid, but accommodations and meals are usually covered.

5. Earn FAA Certification

- After training, you must pass the FAA Certificate of Demonstrated Proficiency Exam to become a licensed flight attendant.
- The FAA requires airlines to regularly conduct safety and emergency procedure training.

6. Start Flying & Gain Experience

- Most new flight attendants start on reserve status (on-call for flights).

- Seniority allows for better routes, schedules, and pay increases.

Electrician
